

Recipe for a favourite treat - Lebanons

Rebecca White writes:

These are really good to make and take on a long walk, or cycle ride.

You will need:
225g (1/2 lb) butter or marge
1 cup sugar
1 egg
225g (1/2 lb) dates
225g (1/2 lb) shredded/desiccated coconut
1 small packet of plain tea biscuits

Melt the butter and sugar in a large pan. Add the chopped dates and boil for 2 minutes. Remove from the heat.

In a bowl, add crushed biscuits, half the coconut and the egg (beaten), mix them together well.

Put the date mixture into a big bowl and add the biscuit mixture to that - don't put too much biscuit in there or they will be dry.

Do not grease the tray. Sprinkle half the remaining coconut at the bottom of a square baking tray, and then spread the mixture 3/4 inch thick. Cover with the rest of the coconut. Set in the fridge and then cut into fingers.

There was a fairground organ, children's fair ride, Christmas Carols, the 'Christmas' tractor, festive stalls, and miniature traction engine rides. There were a lot of happy children there

and the rides behind the traction engine seemed to be a particular favourite. Santa Claus used the





traction engine for his arrival and after carols had been sung, he performed the formal switch on. We would like to thank Jane and the choir for the carols, the stall holders, everyone who contributed to the evening, and of course, Santa. A very big thank you is also due to Chris Raworth who was the main organiser of the event. After the formal switch on there was live entertainment in the Jubilee Room by Sapphire Duo.

Childrens Playground

Thanks are due to Steeple Barton Parish Council for their contribution of £2000 to the cost of the replacement bonded surfacing under the swings and zip wire.

Damage On The Playing Fields Car Park

Significant damage has been done to the wall of the Bowls Club Building by a vehicle, or several vehicles, reversing into it. A claim has been made on the Funds insurance policy but there will be a £500 excess to pay and we will need to erect barriers to prevent a reoccurrence. This is expenditure that the Fund could well do without.

Residents are reminded that, with the exception of one nights parking after attending the Club or an event in the Jubilee Room, overnight parking is only permitted for permit holders (for which there is a charge). A penalty charge applies to all other cases.

The Bartons Memorial Sports And Social Club

The club has had a very difficult year financially and at the time of writing, especially considering the current rate of inflation, its future looks very uncertain. If the Club were to fold then the functioning of the Jubilee Room, the availability of the changing rooms and the operation of the public toilets would all be in jeopardy. Two things are needed: a) volunteers to organise profitable events and help run the club thus reducing wages and b) much more support from residents.

The Jubilee Room

When not in use for events this is available to hire with or without a bar, it has seating for up to 120, a dance floor, stage and a large kitchen. Enquiries to Helen Pauling: hpauling@live.co.uk.

Seasonal Feature - Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday: Will you have pancakes on Shrove Tuesday, 21st February? Many of us enjoy these before Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. ('Ash' because last year's palm crosses are burnt and the ash used to make the sign of the cross on those attending services.) The word 'shrove' broadly means forgiven. Traditionally, Christians would make their confession before Lent and once "shriven", begin a fast for the weeks leading up to Easter, giving up meat or sugary foods. Pancakes on Shrove Tuesday provided a last chance to indulge, and to use up household supplies.

Nowadays, for Lent we still give up something we like, such as sweets or favourite drinks. Alternatively, we may do something extra to help other people. Will you do something different this Lent?

In May a new administration comprising an alliance of three different parties took control of WODC. I am very proud to be a member of the largest group, the Liberal Democrats, even though it has increased my workload somewhat!

It was my intention, in this article, to mention some of the changes (and hopefully improvements) that have happened in the first six months of this alliance.

However, I have recently been told that the future of the DFP is in some doubt, so I have decided instead to express my thoughts about the contribution that this magnificent publication has given our community.

Ever since Jenny and I moved into Middle Barton in 2010, I have always looked forward to reading the DFP. Not only did it publicise some of the activities that I enjoy like Beavers and the Drama Group, but it also brought to my attention things I was completely unaware of, like The Sustainable Bartons, that I joined.



Garden Update

Darren Bullock writes:

Vith our yuletide festivities well and truly over and with the Christmas tree being either packed away or put out for recycling, and the smell of brussel sprouts finally being eradicated from our homes, there may be just one reminder of festive merriment left inside. How many of us are still clinging Christmas that favourite pot plant the good old Poinsettia?



- 8: From August onwards feed with a liquid feed. Tomato feed is perfect.
- 9: Bract formation is the tricky part. Poinsettias require short days and long nights to initiate bract formation (photoperiodism) and a slight drop in temperature (vernilisation).

It may be looking very sad now, missing a lot of leaves but is it's life destined for the great compost bin in the sky or is a Poinsettia for life and not just for Christmas?

In the UK we buy an estimated eight million plants every festive period in shades of red, pink and cream.

So how do we keep these plants growing from year to year. Here are just a few tips for this very difficult plant:

- 1: Ideal temperature 16-28c they hate the cold and drafts.
- 2: Keep the compost damp but never wet.
- 3: As soon as the coloured bracts fade reduce all branches by half their length. Be careful of the sap as it can like all other members of the Euphorbia family cause irritation.
- 4: Keep the plant on the dry side now, this is it's dormant period.
- 5: Repot in your preferred potting compost in June, avoid over potting.
- 6: When growth restarts select five shoots to retain, the remainder can be removed and used for cuttings
- 7: Place plants outside in a sheltered area from August and bring back inside in mid September. Avoid extreme sunny spots.

- 10: If you have a spare warm room (who does these days!!) put your plant in there and restrict day light after eight hours. Avoid switching the light on as one minute of light will reset the plant's internal clock.
- 11: Another alternative is to cover it with a large cardboard box after eight hours of light. Do not use a plastic bag.
- 12: Once your plant has hopefully developed it's bracts, just care for it in the same way.

It is a lengthy process but even if you just repeat steps one to eight you will be rewarded with a very nice foliage pot plant which is helping Poinsettias to become a more sustainable crop.

Wishing you all a very happy New year and here's to a great gardening year.
