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Rachel Lawmon writes:

For many years Peggy was Leader of 1<sup>st</sup> Middle Barton Guides and following her sudden death in November, here are a few memories -

After she moved to Middle Barton, Peggy started with MB Guides in 1981, following on from Maureen Keefe. I joined the unit with her in 1994 and we had many, many happy times until she stood down from active Guiding in 2002. But Guiding did not stop for Peggy – with great enthusiasm, she recruited Guiding friends old and new to open the new MB Trefoil Guild.

With Peggy most of the memories are of camps and pack holidays. And of course, talk of camping with Peggy and the conversation inevitably goes to toilets, or lack of them. Peggy delighted in telling everybody that in her day the toilet was a trench dug out in the field over which she stood astride. Many of our earlier camps were in a field at Fenemore's farm in Clifton and things had progressed a bit further – the trench was a big hole dug out in the corner of the field into which the contents of the toilets were emptied on a daily basis. And to ensure that the contents were aplenty, Peggy used to make sure that during the week there was an ample supply of plums or prunes in the diet to give it a boost.



Peggy's usual job at camp was as Quartermaster – providing a regular supply of food and drink, day and night. Her speciality was making the

porridge for breakfast – this was often prepared the night before, heated up and placed in a haybox to cook overnight. Then by magic in the morning it was hot and ready to eat. Peggy's menus always included plenty of fruit and vegetables and many a sunny afternoon was spent chopping and preparing them in great quantity – Peggy's famous sweet & sour recipe was a favourite, followed by a packed fruit salad. Another favourite was her roast beef dinner – vegetables prepared in the morning and put in a big billy with a big piece of beef over the top and left for the day over the fire. Delicious after a busy day out in the open air.

Peggy loved being outside and enjoying the out of doors. She was always the first up in the morning,

which was fine if you were not sharing a tent with her and not a natural early riser. Accompanied by her dog Shumba, she would then be sat outside, watching the wildlife and drinking a cup of fruit tea. Our enthusiastic Young Leader, Natalie, would inevitably join her for that peaceful time at camp and prepare the fire and breakfast before rousing the sleepy Guides with the 'bummy knocker' – Peggy's big, squeaky hammer for keeping everyone in order. At the other end of the day, it was not uncommon for Peggy to be wide awake, knitting and chatting, whilst the other tired guiders on a Brownie Pack Holiday were trying to sleep after a busy day. But she did produce a lovely crib scene afterwards.

One of our most memorable camps was to Goathland in Yorkshire, where the TV series Heartbeat was filmed. After a long bus journey, we had to carry all the equipment down the long lane to the site, which was right next to the steam railway, with trains coming by and passengers waving to us on a regular basis. An absolute highlight of the camp was to go up to the farmhouse, where they were filming, and to meet the character 'Greengrass'.

Whilst at camp, everyone was given a camp name, often based on a well-known children's book and there was always huge anticipation and excitement at the end of the

camp before the names were announced at the final campfire – mine was Christopher Robin for looking after everyone. Peggy's camp name stayed with her from her early days in Guides – she was very appropriately named Kookaburra, "laugh Kookaburra, laugh". And we all had many laughs together.

Camps with Peggy were traditional and basic, so if you were not keen on DIY loos or washing morning and night with a small bowl of cold water – in Peggy's words – 'tough, just get on with it.'

We had many regular traditions in our unit meetings - an annual event used to be the making of

miniature Christmas cakes. Each one cooked in old tins (which I still have) and then individually marzipanned and iced with a unique design. And Peggy's mincemeat recipe was always a sticky and messy activity – literally mincing the dried fruit through an old mincer. Another favourite in the summer was backwoods cooking over fires down the lane by Steeple Barton Church. And of course the many campfires with Peggy singing and enthusiastically doing the actions to all the songs. Craft activities were Peggy's passion and she loved sharing her skills with others young and older.

Having 'retired' from Middle Barton Guides, Peggy continued Guiding as a member of Trefoil Guild – a friendly group sharing their interest and enthusiasm in Guiding. Peggy was Chair for some years and enjoyed the many activities locally, in county and beyond. And with her love of singing, Peggy was a member of the Oxfordshire Warblers group.



And finally, a couple of quotes from former Guides: 'Peggy was a strong and fearless character, practical and resourceful, she brought creativity, mischief and fun to those meetings.' 'She had that sparkle in her eye when she had an idea that was just very slightly crazy but equally awesome. We

all knew that look meant some adventure was inbound.' 'It feels important to celebrate the mark Peggy made on the lives of so many young women.' Thanks Peggy and, in the words of Taps: 'All is well, safely rest, God is nigh.'

The management at Alpine are keen to know if any of their workforce are speeding through The Bartons, and will take appropriate action if the 'speeders' are Alpine employees.

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# Steeple Barton Parish Council

## Traffic calming

A joint Steeple Barton Parish Council/Westcote Barton Parish Meeting proposal has been prepared in conjunction with Oxfordshire County Council Communities for a 20mph speed limit throughout the two parishes. The proposals will also include a reduction and extension of limits on the roads leading into the village, as well as some traffic calming build-outs along Enstone Road and if needed in other locations. There is a requirement for a public consultation culminating in an exhibition with villagers to rally support and answer any questions that they have. We are hoping that the results of the consultation will enable the Parishes to submit a formal proposal to Oxfordshire County Council shortly.

## Flood prevention

In recent months, there has been a concerted effort to reduce the level of the Dorn riverbed by dredging and clearing the debris underneath the Mill Lane bridge. This has facilitated a much better flow of water. The sewage drain coming down Mill Lane from North Street has also been resleeved and blown through to clear any blockages. The drains at the school have also been cleared to alleviate further pressure during our next period of adverse weather. Connected to this, the village Emergency Plan is to be updated in the new year and will be published on our website.

## Defibrillator

The council would like to thank Simon Day for fitting this adjacent to the electricity box on North Street. This now gives access to the lower end of North Street and the Holliers estate. The one at the Playing Fields serves the upper end of the village.

## Public attendance at our meetings.

In 2022, as always, parishioners are invited to attend our meetings in person to listen and engage in village matters. We hold our meetings on the third Monday of every month at 8 pm, except during August, in the Alice Marshall Hall. Prior to every council meeting, there is an opportunity of up to 15 minutes for members of the public to make comments and to ask questions of the Parish Council.

# Bartons Victory Memorial Hall Fund



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# Morning Run at Middle Barton School

On the first day of term in September everybody was ready to get back out on to the track around the field for Morning Run. With a banner on the fence and a hooter to welcome everyone back, Morning Run soon re-established itself even more strongly than before.



Many children remembered from before the pandemic that if you run a lap (or a few) of the track before school, when you get to 78 laps you have completed a Half Marathon (13.1 miles). This warrants a certificate in Assembly, a mention in the weekly newsletter and your name pinned in the noticeboard by school reception.

The children embraced the challenge with determination and we gained many new recruits as well. At the height of the good weather in October a record number of 73 children ran one morning. Now the weather is deteriorating we are still regularly seeing about 40–45 children participating. All these laps mean that at the time of writing (end of November) we have been able to award 35 Half Marathon certificates, ten certificates for completing a whole Marathon (156 laps) and three pupils have even obtained their certificate for 1½ Marathons (234 laps)!

Even better is that every week more children are achieving their goal, and we have plenty more people who are within a week or two of collecting their certificate! The total distance covered by all the pupils of the school currently stands at 1050 miles, which we are very proud of! With thanks to all those who supported the installation of the Running Track.

## Be Curious – Believe – Challenge – Achieve

The school has hosted its first event since Covid began. It literally went with a bang! It was just amazing to see so many families and members of the community back on school grounds enjoying the fireworks display. A huge thank you to FOMBS for organising such a successful event.

At Middle Barton we have a great love of books and we have been very fortunate to have received 350 new books for school. Each class has been given 50 books to fill their shelves with to help keep up the enthusiasm. The books were kindly purchased through FOMBS and we are truly grateful.



In October, the whole school celebrated Black History month. The event took place in each class and the children recognised the contributions and achievements of people with African or Caribbean heritage and the children also had a fantastic opportunity to challenge negative stereotypes.



The theme for Black History Month this year was 'Proud to be', to celebrate at school each class learnt about significant Black people. We learnt about scientists, artists, sports men and women, musicians, actors, authors, and politicians and why they are important. To share what the children had learnt they created a display in their classrooms for other classes to view. It was a very successful event.

The whole school has also taken part in a range of activities learning about Remembrance. Each class created a display to represent what they had learnt, which was displayed centrally in school. Acorns even made their own wreath and placed it on the village memorial. A display of the children's work was created

and displayed in the church for Remembrance Sunday. The school raised a grand total of £96.60.



A number of children throughout the school have taken part in a range of events this term. Year 6 have taken part in a Street Dance workshop and

Bikeability. Two, Year 5 students attended an AIMS (Able, Interested and Motivated) workshop for English at Chipping Norton School and two attended the AIMS DT workshop. A group of Year 5 and 6 children represented the school at a Boys and Girls Hockey Tournament. A small group of Year 6 children took part in a Literacy Quiz at Chipping Norton School. Another group for Year 6 children had the opportunity to participate in a Boccia event.

The children enjoyed wearing their own clothes as part of the fundraising for Children in Need. The donations go to many worthwhile causes and all contributions were greatly appreciated.

During Anti-bullying week the children learnt all about different types of bullying - physical, verbal and cyber.

### Outdoor Learning and Forest School

The second half of the Autumn term has seen a number of classes taking part in a whole variety of Outdoor Learning and Forest School experiences. Beach class made wind chimes and have been investigating sound, making string phones. Year 6 have been busy digging the pond with the money donated from ENCON. Maples have been making the 'Perfect Compost' and have had an outdoor Stone Age experience- lighting fires and making flatbread. Willows have been investigating force and making ramps in the outdoor classroom.

Sycamores have had their first fire and have loved playing in the leaves and using the rope swing. They have sown up loose branches ready for future fires.

Acorns have been taking part in a range of seasonal activities in Forest school and have built their own Sukkah, from the Jewish festival of Sukkot and also celebrated Diwali outside.


### The 13 Storey Treehouse Series






## The great outdoors

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
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## Christmas Tree Lighting



## Update from Councillor Andy Graham

I am happy to report that I have secured the funding of Section 106 money to contribute to the reducing speed scheme from 30mph to 20mph. This will significantly support a



more permanent solution to the speeding traffic along this busy road, and give priority to safety and particularly the impact it has had on so many residents.

Officers have been working with the speed watch group and the parish council in drawing up the scheme. We are now awaiting costs before deciding how best to implement within a reasonable time frame. This is another example of community engagement with an enormous voluntary effort. I will be officially endorsing my support to this excellent work.

The work done in clearing the River Dorn has been a herculean communal effort. I have escalated the requests for OCC this week to clear the silt, soil and growing vegetation in Mill Lane either side of The Dorn to complete this important work.

The Homes to Schools policy is being reviewed and a deep dive into the issues will be undertaken. This affects many children and parents in the village

particularly those who are put in the difficult position of losing their free schools entitlements because of not choosing their closest school as first preference. There are also mapping/route issues and having sufficient capacity to get children to school. Once dates have been set for this, I will be calling on residents who have contacted me to verify the issues so we can make some headway in finding a solution.

Finally, we are reaching a conclusion to the flooding mitigation measures needed in the centre of the village. We are expecting the final works to be undertaken in January/February 2022. Thanks again to the landowners partnering up to make this happen and the officers at OCC who I brought into solving this problem. It will make a significant difference to the lives of people who have been affected by this in the past.
