We are solely reliant, at the moment, on the funds we receive from our local advertisers. We count ourselves lucky to have such a wide variety of local trades and organisations advertising with us. The fees cover the costs of our production which are for paper, printing, and delivery. Like so many others we are feeling the pinch with costs outrunning our funds and it is clear that our present situation is not sustainable as printing costs have already risen 85% since October and are likely to rise more in the near future. The DFP is in distress! The production team have been urgently considering different ways to keep the DFP going into the future but this will mean we need more funding from a regular source. We are not giving up the production and delivery of the DFP to you without a fight. It means too much to us, the DFP team, and too much for our villages.

Please do contact us if you have any observations or suggestions about ways of helping us out of our current situation. You can do this through our usual contact points in the DFP. Thank you.

COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH

Dave Jackson writes:

We have had a break for a few months recently as we have had to get to grips with new procedures introduced by Thames Valley Police (TVP). Since we started the Speedwatch in early 2019, we had been allowed to train our volunteers ourselves at roadside sessions. But now, in order to co-ordinate the training across the whole TVP area, every volunteer has to do an online training. Thankfully most of the Bartons helpers have done this, so we are now up and running again.

There have also been several other changes in procedures. We now have to go onto the TVP Speedwatch website to log in advance any session we are planning to do. We have to stipulate the exact location, which has been previously verified. Instead of us sending data of motorists travelling at 35 mph or over to a local police contact, we now have authorization to log the data directly on to the system. I am very grateful to Kate Jackson, who has kindly offered to be our coordinator for these online requirements.

We have lost a few volunteers this year with folk moving away or changing jobs, which has thwarted daytime commitments. We are constantly trying to recruit new members, especially as we want to vary our sessions to include early morning and teatime ones. Please get in touch with me if you would like more details

The Happy Gardener!

he garden at home is only of a modest size but I it certainly keeps me busy at weekends. The last few weeks have been full-on with getting the garden summer ready with planting, staking, mulching and watering. But just as you think it's looking okay, the wind picks up and another weekend is spent getting it straight again!

This year I have really been trying to help the bees. With small projects like the wildflower area I wrote about last time, I am really hoping that in our small way we are.

Today I have continued with the bee theme by planting up a small pot with a mixture of bee friendly plants which have included two Lavenders, three small Thyme's and one catnip (Nepeta). These plants will eventually outgrow the container but then I can divide

them up and replant them in the garden. All of the plants came from a local nursery in Chipping Norton. The compost I used was a John Innes No. 2 as it's fairly low in nutrients. As for the pot, any old container will do, just ensure it has adequate drainage holes. It has only just been planted, but placed on our sunny garden table it has already had a lot of bee activity.



Leaders Get Awards As Well.

Three of 1st Bartons' leaders have received awards recently, it's not just the young people who get badges. Chris Brock, Scout Leader, has completed his Leader training and was presented with his Wood Badge and beads. Anne Barras our Group Scout Leader received her 10 years Long Service Award, and John James - AKA Buzzard - our previous Beaver Scout Leader, received the Award for Merit for Services to Scouting.

Beavers and Cub Camp April 2022

After two years, the Beavers and Cubs finally camped at Youlbury, Boars Hill Oxford. We arrived early on Saturday morning, pitched tents, and then headed off for activities. The Beavers all had a go at archery, and Cubs the 3G Swing. The Beavers practised their pioneering skills, lashing together broom handles to make stretchers for sick teddies who needed to go to hospital urgently. The Cubs made a chariot frame which they raced against each other. Osprey came and led a campfire and then a highlight of the camp was the Night Hike to see the 'Infamous Jaffa Cake Tree'. This is an old tree in the middle of a field which mysteriously bears unusual fruit – Jaffa cakes and sometimes Jammy Dodgers if there has been a very wet Autumn! Reports from the children

Pottery Workshop at CNS

At our pottery workshop, they taught us how to make a pinch pot and a coil pot. To make the pottery we each used a ball of clay, which had a cloth over it to keep it moist, a lolly stick, a toothpick and a pot of water to smooth our clay out.

To make a pinch pot, you must roll some clay into a ball and then use your thumbs to push the clay out to form the sides of the pot. Then, you round it into the shape you want and use water to smooth it out. To make a coil pot, we took some clay and rolled it into a ball and then flattened it out. We then took some more clay and rolled it into a sausage shape until it was the right length. It needed to be as long as our flat circle. This was tricky! Then we laid each coil on top until our pot was formed.

We had so much FUN! We would all love to go again as we thought the teachers were kind and funny which made it amazing and more enjoyable. By Talhia and Evie

Beeches Light Railway

Chris Raworth writes:

Anyone watching 'BBC South Today' on 5th. April may recall seeing a feature on an Oxfordshire based privately owned steam railway with a locomotive from the



Darjeeling Himalaya Railway (DHR). What wasn't clear from the feature was that it was within sniffing distance of The Bartons. The Beeches Light Railway is owned by Adrian Shooter at Steeple Aston, and he steams it three of four times a year. The locomotive was built specifically for the DHR by Sharp, Stewart & Co. of Glasgow in 1889 for the steep Himalayan gradients. The 1:22 gradient at the



Beeches makes No.19 really work for it's living! The railway is completely operated by volunteers, some of them professional railwaymen, and some of us locals. The railway is 600yds. long

approximately, with a figure of eight track, and an outer loop; the Indian style station is called Rinkingpong Road.

The BBC spent the day with us which coincided with a visit by some 50 plus model T Fords gathering in

the central paddock, a number having travelled from Europe. A spectacular sight was when they all moved off in convoy heading for the Bicester Heritage site. The Beeches has its own Model T Ford, a



railway inspectors' car. Mounted on rail wheels, and with the steering wheel removed, the track inspector would have ventured out onto the line. Once his task was complete, a hydraulic jack would raise the car off the track on a turntable, the car would be manually rotated, lowered back down, and the inspector could return.

District Councillor Report

Councillor Dave Jackson writes:

At the local elections in May, I was very grateful to the electors of The Bartons ward for giving me their support, and re-electing me with an increased majority. The result was (by party affiliation)



Majority 383 Turnout 47%



My thanks to the residents who voted for me, and, in particular, displayed my orange diamond poster. I think it was fairly obvious that I was standing again!

A third of the council wards (16) were up for selection. The Conservative party retained four wards, but lost seven – five to the Liberal Democrats, one to Labour and one to the Green Party. The result of these changes was that the Conservatives lost overall control.

So a new 'West Oxfordshire Alliance' has been formed from the 'non-conservative' parties, to form a new administration. Our own county councillor, Andy Graham, is also a district councillor, and he has been selected as the new district council leader, with the leader of the Labour group, Duncan Enright, as his deputy.

I requested to carry on with my roles on the planning committee, and the licensing committee (where I have been appointed vice-chair), as I feel that my four years experience has developed my knowledge and confidence. But being part of the new administration means that I have also volunteered to be on the 'Audit and Governance' scrutiny committee.

There are several scrutiny committees, whose role is to scrutinize the work of the cabinet. Under the previous administration, these committees were all chaired by councillors from the ruling group. The new alliance decided that they should be chaired by opposition councillors, who can cast a more critical eye on the work of the cabinet so Conservative members are chairing these committees.

The other extra commitment that I have been asked to undertake is to volunteer to be a WODC representative on some 'Outside Bodies'. So I will attend meetings of *Wild Oxfordshire* and *The Oxfordshire Playing Fields Association*. At the time of writing I have not met the two organisations, and, naturally, I am hoping that they don't meet too often! But they are both representing themes in which I have a keen interest, and *Wild Oxfordshire* may well dovetail nicely into the work of the Sustainable Bartons group.

I am hoping that my extra council workload will not significantly affect the time that I can commit to my other village interests that I so enjoy, such as The Beavers, the school Eco Club, and the Community Speedwatch. I have discussed this with the other volunteers, who are aware that I might have to miss the odd meeting. Only time will tell.
