

Welcome back from Middle Barton School! What an amazing start to the school year. The children have come back so focussed and ready to learn. They all looked very smart in their uniforms and proud to be part of the school. We have

welcomed back Mrs Peedell, who is working in a variety of classes across the school. We also have Miss Winson and Mr Heath with us, who are Associate Teachers embarking on their journey to be qualified teachers. Miss Winson will be working in Sycamores and Mr Heath in Willows.

#### **Classes**

#### **Acorn class**

Our new starters have settled in incredibly well and are already known by so many of the older children. They are learning where everything is in their classroom and outside



and are making



lots of new friends. The class has been making the most of the outside while the weather is still good. The children have been sitting in the

sunshine being read to by Mrs Overton and Mrs Peedell. With Mrs Horner, the class dug up potatoes, and washed and peeled them. They were then baked in the






#### **Maples class**

The class have also taken part in yoga sessions this term and are starting to look at techniques so they can relax. They have begun their Art topic and created mark making pieces of artwork. They have settled in really well with Miss Slyvester and are getting to grips with being in Key Stage 2. The children were thinking of adjectives to describe the three pigs. They have also been looking at the 3 periods with the Stone Age as part of their new History topic. Maples have been describing a setting as part of their English work. In Maths, they have been learning to partition numbers up to 1000.

#### Willow class



What a hardworking class! They have been focussed on writing their diary extracts this term and working with their buddies; improving it to



make it a really excellent standard. In Art, the class has really been challenged this term. The Year 4s have been experimenting with using techniques of scale and ratio to create correct proportions using the grid method. The Year 5s have begun to learn how to use the facial thirds rule as part of their work on drawing portraits.

#### Oak class

The class have already risen to the challenge of being in Year 6! Many children have supported the





Acorns at lunch times; which is just lovely to see. I have already seen some fantastic writing being produced and quite a few have been to ask if they can write in pen. We are so proud of their determination and sense of pride. The class has been reading Beowulf by

Michael Morpurgo as their class text. There has been an emphasis on new vocabulary. They have learnt new words such as; redeemer, hearth, kinsman, plight, larder and envious. The class has

embarked on also their residential to Bushcraft. They have made fires in different ways using matches, flint and steel. batteries and steel.


#### **Under 11s Football Tournament**

#### **Childrens Playground**

t the time of writing the tunnel in the playground his closed for repairs as one wooden supporting wall has collapsed, and another is very loose. This is entirely due to the wood rotting which unfortunately will be an increasing problem as the playground ages. There are also early signs of deterioration in one of the supports for the big swings and this is likely to need complete replacement in the near future. The cost of play quality wood chippings, which need annual topping up and full replacement when compacted, has almost doubled in twelve months. The Management Committee have obtained costings to replace the chippings under the Zip Wire and the 3 Swings with a flexible bonded surface which will save money in the long run but will require an initial significant capital outlay. Your financial support for the playground either through the Cherwell Lottery (Barton's Victory page), fund raising, or more directly by gift aided donations to the fund, is becoming ever more vital if we are to be able to keep the playground fully operational.

#### **Playing Fields Car Park**

Residents are reminded that, with the exception of one night's parking after attending the Club or an event in the Jubilee Room, overnight parking is only permitted for permit holders (for which there is a charge). A penalty charge applies to all other cases.

# **Lighting Up Ceremony For The Playing Fields Live Christmas Tree**

This year's lighting up ceremony will take place on Friday 2nd December. There will be a fairground organ, children's fair rides, Christmas Carols, various exhibits, festive stalls, and hopefully a visit from Father Christmas. After the formal switch on there will be live entertainment in the Jubilee Room by Sapphire Duo. It is anticipated that activities will commence around 5pm with the switch on occurring around 8 pm followed by live music from 8:30 pm. Full details of the programme and timings will be exhibited on the notice board at the entrance to the playing fields when they have been finalised.




# Book Review: Running Wild by Michael Morpurgo

# **District Councilor Update**

Dave Jackson writes.

It is nearly seven years since I instigated a '20's Plenty' campaign along South Street and Church Lane. So, it should come as little surprise that I am pleased that, finally, new speed limits have been introduced in the Bartons. My thanks go to the parish councils

who worked in tandem to submit a scheme for the new regulations, and in particular to Roger Tyers (SBPC) and Steve Ferrelly (WBPC) who had numerous on-site meetings with the OCC Highways representative to discuss possibilities and locations for signage etc.

I am delighted that some of the boundary speed limits have been moved further away from the village, notably the 20 mph signs over the hill from the school, and the new 30 mph signs coming into Westcote Barton, which are now before the hill summit. I had a meeting back in 2018, shortly after becoming a District Councillor, with a traffic official from OCC to ask for those changes to be made, but was not successful at that time.


I also had a meeting with the same official at the top of Rayford Lane, before the parish council replaced the ineffective mirror. I enquired if the speed limit could be reduced from the allotments, and again that was rejected. As a result, I am doubly chuffed we have a 40mph limit at that point.

Not everyone who has spoken to me is in agreement with the new limits. Thankfully we live in a democracy where differing views can be tolerated. I am told that some drivers will simply ignore the lower limits, and that is probably true. This is where Speedwatch will be vital (see the other article, *right*). Sometimes it is difficult to lower speeds right down to 20mph, but I hope most would at least try to get near the mark. It only takes one driver to go slowly to create a mini convoy effect. Sadly, there will be the occasional driver who thinks it is acceptable to overtake, but most drivers do appreciate the need for lower speed limits.

Because the new Alliance elected in 2021 who are in charge of O.C.C. have facilitated the new speed limits, nearly all the parish councils in villages near us have requested 20 mph limits. So, in the next couple of years, we can expect to see limits in places like Sandford St Martin, Kiddington and Wootton. I think that this 'new-norm' of reducing speeds in villages will gradually become the logical mind-set for drivers. Only time will tell.

# **Speedwatch**

Dave Jackson writes,



whole stretch of the main road is an official 20mph limit.

All of our verified Speedwatch sites will now be altered to be 20 mph. We can simply carry on as before with three volunteers monitoring the speed of traffic. We can take the details of vehicles exceeding a certain speed. These details will be the time, speed, location, registration number, and colour and make of vehicle.

We are allowed to send these details to TVP, but for the first three months they will only send out warning letters to vehicles exceeding 30 mph. This is standard procedure to allow for 'familiarisation' of a new speed limit. After that time, all offending drivers will get the standard warning letter.

I have been asked if we need to do Speedwatch now that we have lower speed limits. My answer is that I reckon that it is even more important to keep up our sessions. The presence of our flashing sign will remind drivers of the new speeds, and Alpine F1 works, who are incredibly supportive, are making us some roadside banners to display at our sessions.

We also record the speed of all vehicles on our own forms, so we can work out the percentage of vehicles speeding at different locations, and at different times of the day. This data will be useful to gauge if the average speeds have been reduced since our lower limits have been in force. It will also be help identify if certain locations (like past the church) are still speeding areas, which might be useful evidence if further physical measures are needed (finances allowing). I am particularly keen on the vehicle activated signs, like those in Gagingwell.

We can always do with new volunteers, especially as about 10 of our original members have either moved away, or have new work commitments. The on-line training is quite straightforward, and takes about 40 minutes. Please get in touch.

# **Garden Update**

Darren Bullock writes:

have always been a thrifty gardener, looking at ways to save money in our garden at home can be challenging but, in this winter, when we are all facing unprecedented rises in the cost of living, for me being thrifty is even more important. So here are just a few of my tips.

On visiting garden centres with my loyalty card in hand I look for plants which can be potted on and grown on. These are usually sold as container and basket plants and will often be small shrubs, ornamental grasses, and ferns. Most have a reduced section and many of these plants just require a bit of TLC to perk them up. We have many plants at home that have been reduced!

I buy most of my compost from our two German supermarkets, it can be trial and error, but they compare very favourably with some of the more expensive brands. They are also very good for bulbs, seeds, plants, and sundries. However, I wish they would care for their plants better! Our two local markets in both Banbury and Chipping Norton have two excellent plant stalls where good quality plants can be purchased at bargain prices. Also don't forget car boot sales, local garden club plant sales and even the one at Barton Abbey where excellent plants can bought.

Seeds can be saved from your own garden and swapped with friends, reuse old seed, most packets now have a use by date. If you are worried about their viability just sow a small pinch into a pot of compost, if they germinate you are good to go. A lot of places will also sell off a lot of their seeds just before they put their Christmas stock out...some real savings can be made.

Finally, if you are planting trees plant smaller, bare root ones, these will not only be cheaper but will establish themselves so much more quickly. Being thrifty for me is part of my gardening journey but we must remember that all our local garden centres and nurseries will need our support over the coming months because without us they simply cannot survive.
