

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
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FAREWELL

Gardening Update

It's January the 28th and it feels such a long month with periods of mild and extremely cold temperatures, and I am sure most if not all of the flora and fauna found in and around our gardens has been struggling to cope.

Thankfully life is beginning to return to the garden here at home which always gives me hope that spring and warmer days are on their way. Our first snowdrops started to show just after Christmas and

are now in full bloom. I think it's Galanthus 'S.Arnott' which is a lovely tall variety with a very nice scent. These have been planted now for three years and are beginning to clump up well.

We have a number of trees In our small patch all of which provide interest at various points throughout the year.



My favourite by far is our Winter flowering cherry or Prunus subhirtella 'Autumnalis 'Rosea'. It is a great tree to have for not only it's autumn foliage but for it's blossom. Ours started way back in October and will continue until the spring. Frosts will damage any open flowers, but more will follow on to replace them.

Yesterday as I returned home from work, I noticed for the first time this year the heady scent coming from the flowers on the *Sarcococca ruscifolia* shrubs we are trying to grow into clipped topiary balls as a substitute for Box. These are great evergreen plants which really do perfume the gardens at this

time of the year.

All I need now is a nice sunny weekend to get back out into the garden not only to appreciate these and many other plants but to get the garden Spring ready!

Well, this is my last article and I would just like to



thank the one person who has read my ramblings over the past few years...thanks Mum! Seriously though thank you to all of you who have read my waffling and for supporting the gardens at the Abbey during my tenure as Head Gardener. It was a year ago that I said a sad goodbye to the Abbey and now it's time to say goodbye to you. Wishing you all the very best and "Happy Gardening" to each and every one of you.

BVMHF - Sports & Social Club

It is very sad to be writing this for the last edition of the DFP which I have found to be really useful as a means of letting you all know what is happening with our playing fields. At the time of writing, the claim for the damage to the Bowls club wall is still being processed by the insurers. Over Christmas some volunteers dug out a trench to install a French drain along the wall of the Bowls Club to help prevent damp getting into the inner walls. We would like to publicly thank John Day, Albert Beale and the other volunteers who have worked on this project, also Steve Rogers, those that lent equipment, and Smiths of Bletchingdon who donated and delivered the shingle we needed. Thanks are also due to Ben from Barton Abbey Farms who cut all the boundary hedges for us.

The bad weather has meant the cancellation of several football matches but hopefully they will be re-scheduled for later in the season. We have a number of potential future developments planned (outdoor gym, children's roundabout, installation of solar panels) all of which will only be possible if sufficient funding can be raised.

Finally I would like to remind everyone that the Fund is registered for gift aid so the value of any donations are increased by 25% which is recovered from HMRC; also don't forget that you can support us via the Cherwell Lottery

Annual General Meeting Of The Fund

This was held on Wednesday 25th January. The Treasurer reported that the accounts showed a small surplus for the year, thanks to some generous donations that had been received. The Funds balance in hand at the year end was better than the previous year but we were committed to significant expenditure in the first three months of our accounting year which would reduce this balance by 50%. The Secretary thanked all the volunteers who help to keep the playing fields in operation and tidy: in particular the team of litter pickers, those that inspect the playground equipment regularly, the groundsman Robert Johnson, also John Gardner and the other local tradesmen who help with maintenance and repair.

Finally tribute was paid to Tony Reed who has been Chairman of the Fund for many years: sadly Tony's health no longer allows him to continue in this role. In the past Tony was also the groundsman and he has contributed in many ways over the years to the upkeep of our playing fields, the Bowls Club and the Social Club.

The Club now has a new management committee who are working hard to make it financially sound and secure its future. Like all hospitality venues they are suffering from increased energy costs and price increases on commodities; they need your support so please join and use the club.

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


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
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














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Help before it's all gone

Events

We have had a number of extracurricular events going on in school. Evie H, in Year 5, took part in the AIM (Able, Interested and Motivated) Art event at

Chipping Norton School. She produced a lovely piece of artwork which is currently displayed in the school art gallery. We have also had 8 year 6 children attend the swimming gala at Chipping Norton pool. The team spirit and enthusiasm were amazing, and they were all an absolute credit to the school.

We took 31 children from Years 4, 5 and 6 to the Chipping Norton School to take part in a cross country run. All of the children that participated were just amazing. The support for each other and the determination was phenomenal. They all returned a little muddy, but they had great fun!

Assembly Topics

What motivates you?

As it is the start of a new year, we talked about motivation in our first assembly. We unpicked the things that can motivate us- self-motivation, money, physical rewards, verbal recognition, and many others. It was really interesting to understand what motivates each child; some were just interested in getting more laps around the track than others, while others were self-motivated and just wanted to achieve something for themselves.

Can you learn how to manage under pressure?

We talked about pressure that we may face and how to have strategies in place to support these. The children were very open and shared some of their own strategies.

Do we throw things away too easily?

In assembly, we learnt about upcycling shops and the Repair Cafe in Wales. We realised that we were actually quite good at upcycling at school.

How much control do influence have over our topics?

We talked about influences and what impact they can have on the choices we make. The focus was on the drink 'Prime' and how those behind the product (KSI and Logan Paul) had influenced so many to go out and buy it! The assembly ended with some reflection time. Whilst influences may guide our choices, it's important for us to remember to make our own decisions with an open mind, considering both positive and negative consequences.

Curriculum

Acorn class




They have been very busy learning all about cleaning their teeth and how important it is. I saw that the dinosaurs were all waiting to have their teeth cleaned. They have also made some lovely Gingerbread people with Mrs Horner. The children have been learning all about the Lunar New Year. They have been dancing



around school with dragons and even had a banquet celebrate. As it is the year of the rabbit, they have making been rabbit shaped biscuits. Pizzas have also been on the menu. They spent a morning making pizzas with a



variety of toppings. They didn't last long! They have started learning about sea creatures in class and have read Commotion in the Ocean - one of my favourites!



Sycamore class

In Maths, Sycamore class have been learning all about 3D shapes and money. They have gone back in time this week to the Victorian era. They have been learning about Victorian houses and how they compare to houses today. They have also been learning about Florence Nightingale in History and what she did to help make changes to medical practices today.

Maple class

The children have been working on poetry and when I walked in during a lesson, they were talking all about alliteration and onomatopoeia.

They have also started a new writing unit and are writing a diary. In Maths, they have been learning about multiplying and dividing by 8. They listened to a very catchy song to help them learn how to count in 8s! They have also been learning to use their times tables and place value knowledge to solve questions using larger numbers (50 x 6). In RE, they have been learning about the main beliefs of Islam. One day this term, I visited class to find them all lying on the floor with torches. I was quickly informed they were using torches to learn about light and shadows as part of this term's Science topic. In Art, they have been planning out their self-portraits.

Willow class

They have ventured back to ancient times and have been learning about Ancient Greece. The class has been researching about Gods and Goddesses as part of their English. Reading lessons have been linked to their history topic on Ancient Greece- they will all be walking Ancient Greek encyclopaedias soon with the amount they are learning about! In Maths, they have been learning to multiply with a focus on multiplying 4digit numbers by 2 digit numbers. The class has also been focussing on division. The children have worked really hard to understand and use the method taught. In Art, Year 5 are going to produce a piece of artwork based on the artist Kehinde Wiley using acrylics. The Year 4s will be producing artwork in the style of Quentin Blake.

Oak class

They have continued to plan and collect items for their 'Green House' project- please keep collecting 2 litre bottles- I have been informed they need 1500! I have also been informed that they will need 100 canes! I am going to be very intrigued when this starts being built to see how big it is actually going to be! In Maths, they have been learning about using scale factors to increase the size of a shape. I have seen some lovely practical Science going on in Oaks class. The children were learning about the refraction of light and were experimenting using light, an image and a glass of water. A few things got a little damp but there were also some wow moments too. They have also been writing diary extracts linked to their History topics about the Vikings.

Future Elections In The Bartons

My four-year term of office for The Bartons ward will not be finished until 2026, and Andy Graham's County Council seat will terminate in 2025. So, the next election in our area is likely to be a general election.

You may have heard that The Bartons will likely be part of a re-formed Banbury constituency, not Witney. There is some confusion about this, so I thought this might be an opportunity to try and clarify matters.

The boundaries commission are wanting to make most parliamentary constituencies with roughly the same number of electors (except for huge rural areas like The Highlands of Scotland). So areas where there has been large amounts of new houses, like Oxfordshire, will gain a new constituency, whereas more urban areas (like inner cities) may lose one.

The proposal is to create a new constituency, most likely to be called "Bicester and Woodstock" This is taking out huge chunks of the present Banbury and Witney constituencies, so they are gaining smaller areas adjacent to them. So, the proposal (which will be ratified in June) means that The Bartons, Charlbury and Chipping Norton will go into The Banbury constituency

One point of confusion is that this is nothing to do with the local government set-up, so we will still be part of West Oxfordshire District council, and Oxfordshire County Council. So, I am afraid you are stuck with me for over three more years! Sadly, the demise of the DFP will undoubtedly mean that it will not be as easy for me to keep you updated, especially if, like me, you are not a great user of social media. Let's hope a different version of the DFP might rise from the ashes of this marvellous publication.

Book Review


The Explorer by Katherine Rundell

Special Services during Lent and Easter

There is plenty planned for Lent and Easter this year. You can be sure of a warm welcome at all of the services and events.

This year we celebrate Mothering Sunday on 19th March with services at 9.30am in Nether Worton and an 11am Family Eucharist in Sandford St Martin and a Barton Churches Together Service at the Alice Marshall Hall at 5pm.

Seasonal Feature: Palm Sunday 2 April

Come to Westcote Barton Church for "Family at Church" on Palm Sunday, 2 April 2022, and meet George the Donkey: short children's service from 9.30am, breakfast and coffee from 9am. Children may like to take part in acting out the Palm Sunday story: to quote an old Sunday School hymn, "on the first Palm Sunday morning, Jesus rode to Salem town; little children ran to greet him, spreading green palm branches down". So, Jesus rode into Jerusalem. The people were hoping for a King, like King David, and in the words of the Christmas carol, "born of David's line". However, He didn't arrive with a conquering army or with great fanfares, but instead, He arrived humbly, riding on a donkey, to show that He came in peace. This was a fulfilment of an Old Testament prophecy.

Palm Sunday is the beginning of Holy Week. This leads us up to Good Friday, the only day of the year

when, traditionally, we should be eating Hot Cross Buns, although they are now available all year round. We wait until Easter Sunday to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus with Easter Eggs.



During Holy Week which runs from 2-8 April we will be having Night Prayer (Compline) on zoom at 9pm on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Then, on 6 April, Maundy Thursday, there will be a Benefice Service and supper at 8pm in the Alice Marshall Hall.

On **Good Friday** there is an all-age service in Duns Tew at 10am and then a reflective service in Sandford St Martin from 2-3pm.



On Saturday 8 April, we hold the Easter Vigil and Eucharist at 8pm in Westcote Barton, followed by a glass of bubbly.

Easter Day Services on 9 April are at 9.30am in Steeple Barton and Sandford St Martin and at 11am in Over Worton and Duns Tew (where it's also livestreamed via zoom). Full details of all the Lent and Easter services will be on the website.

Lent Lunches and Study Groups

During Lent our study group will meet every Tuesday at 8pm, starting on 28 February. The venues will be confirmed but there is also the option to join the meeting on zoom.

We will be reading "Reflections for Lent". This gives a daily Bible verse, short reflection, and prayer. It is available as a paperback and also on kindle/e format online from Church House Publishing.

Middle Barton Bowls Club

Middle Barton Bowls Club is celebrating its Centenary this year having been founded in 1923 playing on the Rectory Lawn opposite the church in Westcote Barton. In 1953 the Bowls Club moved to their current location at the Playing Fields on Worton Road.



The club today is thriving and has a current membership of 52 of which about 45 are playing members. The club plays most Tuesdays and Saturdays throughout the summer months hosting local clubs and visiting these for the away matches. It's great fun and each game ends in refreshments and a friendly chat.

In the winter the club plays indoors on their short mat which is an enjoyable, friendly afternoon with teams from within the club.

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
